## THE INVOLVEMENT OF ELDERS & KNOWLEDGE HOLDERS

7 Elders and Knowledge Holders were involved in programming with children and youth in 2023.

Elders are involved in guiding program development such as curriculum design, and are also welcomed to all outdoor and land-based programs with children and youth. During staff training weeks Elders are also invited so that staff can learn how to best support Elders' needs and offerings while engaging in programming with children and youth.



## REDUCING BARRIERS TO PARTICIPATION

Rivers to Ridges wants to empower all families to get their children outside more often. Since 2019, 22 children have attended programming with the support of the Strong Roots Bursary Fund.



In 2018, the Strong Roots Bursary Fund was created in order to welcome all children into the forest.

This fund is made possible through the generous offerings of local donors and sponsors.

In addition, a portion of organizational revenues are donated back into this fund.

The Bursary Fund may award up to 70% of a child's program costs.

# EMPOWERING A NEW GENERATION TO BE Stewards of the land and the people

The Heartwood Youth Leadership Training camp focuses on youth 13 and up. Individuals join the Rivers to Ridges team for a week of youth-focused training, bringing their skills and passions to life on the ground as youth leaders volunteering with younger participants. The program introduces game facilitation, empathy through play, crafting and building, skill development, and much more.

Some youth who began as campers 6 years ago have returned to Rivers to Ridges to become youth leaders who support the Heartwood Youth Leadership Training camp.

## SOUTHERN LAKES CARIBOU IN THE SCHOOLS:

<u>Caribou in the Schools: A Southern Lakes</u> <u>Caribou Learning Resource</u>, allows educators to engage students in the unique history and ongoing story of the Southern Lakes Caribou.

In addition to the Learning Resource, six Community Booklets have been created to celebrate the distinct perspectives, knowledge, and language of each First Nation in the Southern Lakes Region. The resource combines a Western Science worldview with the perspectives and contributions of Elders and Knowledge Holders who have been a pivotal part of the incredible story of the Southern Lakes Caribou.

Educator Activity Guide & Resource Manual The educator activity guide and resource manual has been designed with revised Yukon curriculum in mind.

Salmon in the Schools aims to strengthen education and awareness around Yukon salmon, including those in the Yukon River, Porcupine and Alsek River drainages. The program is creating a community of educators who are working to engage their students with local salmon stories, and to foster a sense of stewardship for Yukon's salmon populations.
