

HUMBLE BEGINNINGS

Treaty Talks NWT is a passion project cofounded by Jacey Firth-Hagen, Peter Greenland, and Marlisa Brown; three youth from the Northwest Territories who are passionate about treaties and self-determination, and learning how to navigate our modern world with the teachings of their Elders, communities, and families.



From October to December, 2021, Treaty Talks NWT held online speaker sessions that featured knowledge keepers, Elders, and individuals from many nations who were able to share their expertise with attendees. A wide variety of topics were covered in just 8 short weeks, including self-governance, misconceptions about Métis people, and advocating for Northern youth issues.




DAY 2: MAKING SENSE OF TREATIES, LAND CLAIMS, AND SELF-GOVERNANCE AGREEMENTS


DAYS 3 & 4: SELF-DETERMINATION
