The Qarmaapik House Program won the **2016 AIP** \$700,000 prize.

QARMAAPIK (TINY HOUSE)

Qarmaapik House is located in the Northern Village of Kangiqsualujjuaq, a small Inuit village of about 900 residents, in Nunavik. It was created in response to the rise of children in foster care under youth protection.

Its mission is to provide a space where parents or guardians can receive support to better meet the needs of their children and strengthen the bond within their family by instilling traditional Inuit family values.

VISION


Prevent children from being placed in foster families and/or sent to another community by the Youth Protection, help families in need and strengthen connections between the youth, adults, and the community with the assistance of Elders, who have traditional knowledge and Inuit values.

COMMUNITY-DRIVEN INTERVENTIONS

A welcoming and safe space for Inuit families in crisis, the Qarmaapik House is a community-first response that deploys 'Inuit Community Interveners' to support families. If, after seven days at the family house, clients still haven't been able to work out their problems, only then their files are handed over to youth protection.

The approach deploys a multidisciplinary team comprising of community health and social services providers, counsellors, Inuit Elders, and educators coming together to help parents overcome their challenges and raise safe, healthy children.

In the first year after receiving AIP funding, Qarmaapik took in 35 client families; 24 of these families came voluntarily, meaning they had reached out directly to Qarmaapik for help. Another 11 client families were referred by social services or other community partners.

The AIP funding has helped increase the number of team members providing support to families and children.

FAMILY PROGRAMS

Qarmaapik offers many prevention programs delivered by a team of counsellors, psychologists, elders, cooks.



A family strengthening program for families involved in youth protection cases. This program helps with communication and structuring at home, as well as for the family, working towards a better lifestyle.



Self-care events for single parents and their children (berry picking, evening manicures, massage therapy, babysitting/games, etc.).



Programs targeting men, such as caribou hunting for the community or a breakfast program for men.





In August 2023, the Qalirusilik camp opened, featuring a healing cabin and a tent, for community members to come together and gather berries, fish, or simply spend time on the land. The camp is for the community and made available at a community's request.

Qarmaapik played a significant role in setting up and running the camp.




SUPPORTING AND TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION

Many activities are designed to support and empower youth by teaching them various skills and providing them with employment opportunities. For example, students were hired to help with summer camp and plan activities for children aged 5 to 17.

Youth have gained management and leadership skills and have taken on other roles at Qarmaapik or in the community. For example, a coordinator who worked at Qarmaapik facilitating youth activities, is now a manager for the Housing Bureau. One of the youth participants is now a counselor working at Qarmaapik.







BROADENING THE REACH

Qarmaapik House has secured a vehicle for employees, mostly counsellors, to respond to emergency calls at any time directly from community members. They increased the team of counsellors from two to five to better respond to community needs.

Qarmaapik House staff offers training to workers in other Nunavik communities. They hope they can help other communities by sharing what they have learned.
